Richland Farmers' Market kicked off June 19 at Half-Shire

(Richland) In 2017, we started a Saturday Farmers' Market in Richland on our front lawn with mixed results. Organized as a joint venture with the Richland Park Association, the market carried on intermittently through 2020. With the Grant Memorial Barn's construction and additions, we relaunched the Richland Hamlet

Farmers' Market on Wednesdays beginning June 19, 2024. The weekly event is open to any craft, food, or informational vendor free of charge. We have held the market each Wednesday from about 3 p.m. with the option of tables in the pavilion, lawn or barn and working from the back of one's car, truck or tent is available to vendors.

Barb Fuller of Dancing Goat Farm has been on site with her popular goats and goat soap products weekly. Our trustee **Doreen Tilton** has had misc.



craft and household items as well as homemade candies and baked goods. Pulaski Lions Club has offered food each week from their food truck. Linda Trombly has antique jewelry while **Lisa Yesensky** of Greenhouse Effect Gardens has offered plants and herbs weekly.

We have had several other crafters and have hoped, with the new space, to offer a mid-week respite, ending each night (weather permitting) with a small campfire.

Sandra Langer has conducted children's crafts, games and giveaways. Horseshoe pits, corn hole boards and a new electronic dart board in the barn have been popular. Despite some rainy and windy nights, live music has been planned for each night, and we will gauge the weather into September to perhaps continue longer. Popular blues band Dam Dog kicked things off on June 19, with the Dancing Witches of the Lake Ontario Broom Riders also performing for charity. Historical and genealogical research has been available in the main building with weekly feature displays.

We hope "Wednesdays at the Barn" will become a popular repast this summer and in the future. On the first night, we offered a strawberry shortcake social. We will add a link to the website at <u>www.halfshire.org</u> to keep

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you updated on weekly events as they are set.

A new balcony on the second floor of the barn has also been a popular venue to relax and view the market with an excellent view of the lawns and activities,

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President's Report, Shawn Doyle-

Our timelines for newsletters continue to be off. The December newsletter went out on February 20, two months later. As we worked to wrap it up, we expanded the issue by four pages to accommodate the additional stories and the growing list of obituaries. This current newsletter for "March" is now five months late; as I write, in early July, we are already late for June. As you can imagine, obituaries are piled up, and we will cut off what we had through early April.

The problems that cause delays have been plentiful. We have been swamped with catering events at the building, meetings, and some larger estate donations that need immediate attention in sorting and inventory.

On an average day, I arrive thinking I will have time to focus on the newsletter, and other paperwork, and then the phone rings or guests drop by, which is all good! We are finding the need for more volunteers, as those who are here most days are very busy. Additionally, the various construction projects on site have to be organized and overseen.

This said, looking back over the past four months, we have accomplished a great deal and taken in some beautiful artifacts, photos, and documents. We were saddened by the loss of a long-time member, **Malcom Adsit** of Adams, NY; however, we were very gratified that there were many things left for us, and working with the family, we found an enormous collection of old photos from Redfield and surrounding area that was almost all labeled! Also, from the Adsit estate, we took in many beautiful cups and saucers that belonged to the late **Ann Minosh Adsit**, as well as her collection of Fenton glass. These items are all on display across the tracks at Rural and Migrant Ministry and are there on loan as we do not have proper display space here. The DAR held a luncheon in March at RMMOC, and the ladies enjoyed using the tea sets!

Capital work began in June, as we were awarded a grant of \$8,000 from the Greater Pulaski Community Fund to expand the concrete pads around the barn. We also poured footers for the first phase of the back porch on our main building. The 12' x 24' porch now serves also as a stage for outdoor music events. We completed this on June 19. Monies for this project were raised by a Facebook fundraiser this winter, for which we are all very grateful!

With so many events planned for the summer, this stage/porch has proven a great asset. The Richland Farmers Market has used this weekly, as well as small gatherings such as the SCCS class of 1964 for their luncheon/reunion.

In early June we hosted the Heritage Foundation bus tour, held the APW 50th class reunion on Sunday, June 9. Then on the last weekend of June, there were four Pulaski reunions (1974, 1959, 1964, and 1969), a bus tour, and a Sunday breakfast. We hope to see many more of our readers this summer. We are generally open Monday through Friday and often on weekends from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Best to call ahead if you are coming from afar.

Remembering Friends (February 2024 through April 10, 2024)

(Half-Shire volunteers clip from the Pulaski, Camden, and Watertown newspapers weekly and scan the internet for death notices of significance to the area. We have a comprehensive index available online on our website. We select significant deaths from this extensive collection that touched our organization, officers, members or communities. We try to represent our 15 towns and their people in all we do, and this small selection is just a sample of our weekly additions; full obituaries are in our collection.

<u>Martha C. Tubbs</u> (May 23, 1936-Jun 1, 2023) Born in Sandy Creek, the daughter of William J. and Ellen (Corse) Potter, Martha married Clifford E. Tubbs in 1962. Martha passed away last year in Kingman, AZ, and we were just notified. She was a past member of ours.

Jeffrey Hiscock-(Feb 17, 1970-Nov 29, 2023) Born in Watertown, the son of Ramon and Florence (McKenna) Hiscock, Jeff was a 1988 graduate of APW schools and went on to SUNY Potsdam, earning a degree in chemistry in 1992. Jeff was a great sports fan, and his loss to his family was devastating. A celebration of life was held at Half-Shire this spring.

Estelle Perry Hilton (Jul 28, 1927-Dec 20, 2023) Born in Port Arthur, TX, Estelle was the daughter of the late Allen Minton and Agnes Corinne (Borne) Perry. She was married in 1948 to Earl M. Hilton, Jr. of Louisiana, a GGG grandson of Orwell pioneer Peter Hilton. Estelle and her family were active LDS church members, and they compiled a detailed family history of their ancestors. She was long-time member of Half-Shire, and at her death, Estelle left nine children, 63 grandchildren, 167 greatgrandchildren, and six great-great-grandchildren! Irene Dewine-(Nov 7, 1940-Dec 21, 2023) Born in Liverpool, NY, the daughter of William and Genevieve (Wojcieson) Davis, Irene was a 1958 graduate of Onondaga Central High. She married Joseph Dewine of Oswego and served as a correction officer and later court attendant for Oswego County. She was trained as a nurse's aide at Oswego Hospital. Irene was the mother of four sons and a daughter who survive. Joseph died in 1990.

Bradley Chavis - (May 11, 1957-Feb 3, 2024) Born in Washington State, the son of Gilbert and Frances (Smith) Chavis, Brad married Mary McDaniel of Altmar. He is survived by three children, including Joe Battles of Altmar. Stephen C. Sattler (Jul 23, 1941-Jan 4, 2024) Born in Bluefield, West Virginia, the son of Charles and Bernice (Smith) Sattler, Steve served in the Marines after high school. He went on to earn a degree in business administration from Mt. Vernon Nazarene College in Ohio. While living in the Sandy Creek area for several years, Steve was an active community member, serving in the Oswego County Legislature, the Sandy Creek Fire Dept., the Fair Association and the Sandy Creek Masons, where he served as Master. He was best known for his years with WSCP Radio, which he helped found in the 1970s. Married to the former Kathleen Crouch in 1965, the couple has two sons who survive, Eric and Stephen, as well as five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Steve maintained many ties to our region after relocating to Delaware, Ohio, and was a Half-Shire member. A daughter, Summer, and two siblings predeceased him.

<u>Winford Joyner Smith</u>-(Aug 25, 1947-Jan 17, 2024) Born in Lowville, the son of Winford and Arlene (Joyner) Smith, "Wynn" was a 1965 graduate of Belleville Academy. He married the former Audrey Marie Hulsizer in 1976, and together they operated the Townhouse and the Roadhouse in the 1980s. The couple has four surviving children, 12 grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. Several members of the family have been Half-Shire members.

James Leddy (Nov 29, 1925-Jan 18, 2024) Born in Great Bend, NY, the son of Francis and Pauline (Keppler) Leddy, he was married to the late Helen Souva (1928-2022). The couple had four children: Rosalie, Kathleen, Gary (1949-2018), and Roger (who was married to the late <u>Suzanne</u> <u>Yerdon</u> (Apr 18, 1953-Jul 13, 2023), daughter of the late Clayton & Erma (Mead) Yerdon of Redfield). Roger and Suzanne were members of Half-Shire. James and Helen were a day short of their 75th wedding anniversary when she passed away in 2022.

Gilbert Grover Trumble-(Jul 25, 1928-Feb 11, 2024) Born in Albion, the son of Frederick and Roxanna (Trumble) Britton, Grover attended Altmar schools and went on to serve in the US Navy (1945-1947) where he was awarded a Purple Heart. He married the former Faylene Balch in 1948 and worked 40 years for Camden Wire. Grover was a life member and past Commander of Williamstown VFW, serving as Oswego County Commander. He was an active outdoorsman and wellregarded in his community. Grover was a past member of Half-Shire and is survived by his six children, 16 grandchildren, and 30 great-grandchildren as well as a host of friends. A memorial veteran banner with his image hangs on Main Street in Williamstown.

Barbara Hubbard-(Jul 16, 1951-Feb 13, 2024) The daughter of Howard and Martha (Davis) Hubbard, Barb was a 1969 Pulaski schools and 1973 graduate of SUNY Potsdam. She worked in Pulaski for American Finance and later McKean Insurance. Barb was active in the community and a member of the Fernwood Methodist Church. She was active in many church affairs. Barb was also a well-known softball player in her youth. Several members of the family are members of Half-Shire; survivors include sisters Joanne Cossa, David, Kathy and Ken Hubbard as well as several nieces and nephews and many friends. A brother, Robert, died in 2006.

Anita Wheeler-(June 7, 1944-Feb 9, 2024) Born in Petaluma, CA, the daughter of Donald and Helen (Fargo) Morehouse, Anita was married in 1966 to James Wheeler of Pulaski. Five children and four grandchildren survive as does her husband, Jim. Several family members are members of Half-Shire, and we extend our condolences. **Patricia Dutch**-(Feb 29, 1964-Feb 7, 2024) Born in Tennessee to Karen Tobiasson, she was also raised by stepfather Lawrence Witzigman and lived in Osceola. Pat was known as Diane to her friends. She was a certified genealogist and enjoyed family research. Several nieces, nephews and good friends survive.

Lawrence Twiss-(Feb 29, 1944-Feb 18, 2024) Born in Mexico, the son of George O. and Lilly (Akins) Twiss, Larry

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was the great-grandson of Sam Manchester, who owned "Tally Ho," the rambling old farm on the Redfield-Florence Road, The Manchester family drove one of the last stagecoaches in the area. Sam's daughter Julia married Frank Twiss, a well-known cheesemaker. Larry and his wife Carolyn raised six children in the Mexico area, and grandchildren and great-grandchildren also survive them. Timothy Bryant-(June 16, 1944-Feb 9, 2024) Born in Rome, the son of the late John J. and Pauline (Helbock) Bryant, Tim was a lifelong resident of the McConnellsville area and attended Camden schools and Syracuse University, going on to college in NH where he graduated as valedictorian. He returned home later to take over the family business, G. W. Bryant Core Sands. Tim was very active in his community and surrounding area. His late mother was a Half-Shire member.

Two weeks later, Tim's sister <u>Candace A. Bryant</u> (Nov 12, 1948-Feb 25, 2024) passed away after a short illness. A Camden schools and Wells College graduate in Aurora, Candace worked with her parents and brother in the family business for many years. She was a talented pianist and singer, active in St. John's Church in Camden. She and her brother are survived by their many Bryant and Helbock cousins.

Jane Ann Sullivan Spellman-Nov 9, 1930-Feb 12, 2024) Born in Fulton, the daughter of Judge Eugene and Ruth (Reedy) Sullivan, Jane Ann was educated in Fulton schools. She went on to Smith College in Massachusetts, earning a degree in 1952. She worked for Girl Scouts of America for a time before settling in the Mohawk Valley where she worked for 53 years at the Herkimer County Historical Society. Jane Ann married James Spellman of Ilion, who passed away in 2004. Jane Ann was the author of two volumes of biographies of notable women in the Herkimer/Oneida County region, Women Belong in History. She spent time each summer at the family cottage on Ramona Beach in Richland. Sister-in-law Frances Sullivan and daughter Margaret are valued members of Half-Shire. Beverly Benedetto-(March 18, 1936-Feb 21, 2024) Born in Bayonne, NJ, the daughter of Michael and Estelle (Czaplicki) Zaniznick, she married Pasquale Benedetto and moved to Amboy, NY. The couple raised a family of seven children. Bev was active in her adopted community, assisting in many organizations. Among her survivors are her son, Hon. Thomas Benedetto.

Nellie Luella Carnrite Moran-(Feb 24, 1932-Feb 2024) Born in Lacona, the daughter of Ephraim and Lillian (Stacy) Carnrite. Luella attended Sandy Creek schools and married Al Moran, who died in 2003. Among her survivors are three children and her sister, Mary Mason of Oswego, a valued member of Half-Shire.

Joseph Woods-(Feb 26, 1989-Feb 26, 2024) The son of the late Richard Woods and the former Christine Parkhurst, Joe attended APW schools. He lived in the Pulaski area, and his passing was a significant loss to his loved ones. Among his survivors are his mom, stepfather Tim Bacon, siblings Richard, Emily, stepsiblings Kari Schulte, Kenny Bacon, Alaina Bacon and Erin Klarner (one of our regular editors and life members) as well as several aunts, uncles and cousins.

<u>Judith McCarthy-(Oct 17, 1946-Feb 24, 2024)</u> Born in Hackensack, NJ, the daughter of Julius and Dorthea (Matcalfe) Thaisz, Judy was the valedictorian and president of Morrisville-Eaton Central class of 1964. She studied at Cornell University and later worked for the Oneida Dispatch as a reporter. She married Frederick "Mac" McCarthy, Sr., a NYS trooper, and settled in Fulton. Judy was an active member of her adopted community and sat on the Fulton Friends of History board. She was a longtime member of Half-Shire. Among her survivors are six children, many grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and many good friends.

Edison Jordal-(Nov 9, 1945-Feb 26, 2024) The son of Otto Francis and Dorothy A. (Griffin) Jordal, Ed was a 1964 graduate of Mexico schools. Ed married the former Carolyn Jackson in 1967, and the couple had two sons, Daniel and Darren. Carolyn passed away in 2016. Several members of the family are Half-Shire members.

Alfred Thibault-(Oct 2, 1934-Feb 27, 2024) Born in Salem, MA, the son of Emil and Blanche (Cote) Thibault, Alfred was an Army veteran serving at Ft. Knox. He married his wife of 66 years, Maxine Jones, and the couple raised a family of five children that now includes 16 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. She married Julian Short of Connecticut in 1954. The couple later lived in Tonawanda, NY, where they raised their four surviving children. Velma was sister-in-law to our Trustee Florence Gardner, and her celebration of life was held at Half-Shire.

Leonard Pringle-(Nov 19, 1927-Mar 3, 2024) Born in Fulton, the son of F. Roy and Mary (Revitt) Pringle, Leonard was an Amry veteran of WWII, returning to work for Nestle in Fulton many years, and later the Oswego County Sheriff. He was married 74 years to the former Violet Ryder, who passed away in 2021. Among their survivors are son Myron, daughter Melinda Canale, six grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren. **William J. Carey**-(Nov 6, 1954-Mar 3, 2024) The son of

Gerald F. and Madeline (Hart) Carey, Bill graduated from Moravia High, went on to earn his teaching degree at SUNY Oswego and taught technology many years at Mexico High School. He had a passion for history and antiques and was interested in local history. Five siblings survive Bill. <u>Karen Macklen</u>-(Apr 21, 1958-Mar 8, 2024) Born in Watertown, the daughter of the late Frank and Kay (Moore) Ramsey, Karen was a 1977 graduate of South Jefferson schools. She married Mark Macklen of Worth in 1980, and the couple have two children and two grandchildren who survive. Karen was a niece of Harold Samson, author of *Tug Hill Country*.

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Lois Kaminski-(Aug 26, 1947-Mar 9, 2024) Born in Worcester, MA, to L. Paul and Marcia (Rice) Clark, Lois and her husband, John Kaminski, settled in Williamstown after they spent time in the US Navy. They had two daughters, 18 grandchildren and 17 great- grandchildren at her death. The family also hosted 17 exchange students, and over the years, Lois was very involved in the Williamstown Fire Auxiliary.

Lisa Williams-(Aug 21, 1981-Mar 10, 2024) was born in Oswego, the daughter of Robert McCarthy and Kathleen (Harmon) McCarthy. Lisa was a preschool teacher for SUNY Oswego daycare and the area YMCA for many years. Lisa's mom, Kathleen, is a long-time member of Half-Shire. Albert Alonzo Fellows of the 110th Regiment, By Natalie J. Woodall

(Richland) Born in May 1843 in Pulaski, NY, Albert Alonzo Fellows was a son of Isaac Fellows (Sept. 22, 1800-Jan. 11, 1874) and Cynthia Young (1805-March 8, 1881). He was the fourth child in a family of five.

Sometime after the 1855 New York census was taken, Albert left Oswego County to work as a clerk in Pontiac, Livingston, IL. Shortly after the Civil War began, recruiting for soldiers was started in Illinois, and in August, the 39th Illinois was organized. Nicknamed the Yates Phalanx after Governor Richard Yates, the regiment recruited over 800 men, and among them was 19-year-old Albert Alonzo Fellows, who enlisted on Aug. 1, 1861, and mustered into Co C. After training in Missouri and Maryland, the Yates Phalanx moved to Virginia. It was attached to the Army of the Potomac. In March 1862, the 39th participated in the battle of Winchester, or, more correctly, the battle of Kernstown, the only conflict Confederate General Stonewall Jackson lost. While the battle itself took place on March 23, 1862, the previous day, Union pickets were overrun, and many were taken captive. Corporal Fellows was one of them. He was marched off to Richmond and confined in Libby

The prison consisted of three buildings confiscated by Confederate military authorities in March 1862. Later, it was reserved for Union officers. In its early days, it housed enlisted men, and on April 14, Fellows entered its gates. According to the Town Clerks' Registers, he spent 52 days there, which is incorrect. He was in Confederate hands for 51 days, but only 28 were spent in Libby. Albert was paroled on May 11, 1862, and discharged from the Union Army on May 30. It is pretty likely that he immediately headed for his parents' home to rest and recuperate.

Albert and his brother James Grant (April 14, 1844-April 14, 1911) enlisted in the 110th Regiment at Pulaski on August 19, 1862, and mustered into Co. B. Perhaps because of his prior military experience, Albert was appointed a first lieutenant. On January 10, 1863, he was promoted to captain and transferred to Co. I.

The 110th Regiment left the state at the end of August and headed for Camp Patterson in Baltimore, MD. In November, they boarded the steamer Ericsson to begin a journey to Louisiana. After engaging in several minor conflicts, the110th was ordered to rebel-held Port Hudson, a fort on the Mississippi River strategically important for the Union and the Confederacy. On June 14, 1863, General Nathaniel Banks, commanding officer of the 19th Army, ordered a charge up the steep slopes behind Port Hudson in a disastrous effort to dislodge the Confederates. Among those selected for this ill-conceived and doomed venture were companies B and I of the 110th Regiment.

In February 1864, the 110th was ordered to Fort Jefferson in the Gulf of Mexico, which the Union Army used as a prison. Captain Fellows performed detached duty as an assistant inspector general at regimental headquarters in Key West. He also participated in the battle of Fort Myers, a little-known skirmish considered the southernmost battle of the Civil War. The Union Army confiscated 4500 head of cattle, and angry local cattlemen, later dubbed the Cow Cavalry, marched to Fort Myers on Feb. 20, 1864, demanding that Colonel James Doyle surrender. Colonel Doyle responded that he would never surrender and threatened to destroy the mob. After several hours of fighting and a few casualties, the farmers withdrew.

Although the war officially ended in April 1865, the 110th remained at Fort Jefferson, awaiting a replacement regiment. In August, the 161st arrived, and the men of the 110th boarded a ship bound for New York Harbor. They arrived on Aug. 24 and headed to Albany, where they were paid and mustered out on Aug. 28.

On Jan. 1, 1866, Fellows and several companions took the train from Richland to Sand Bank (Altmar) to visit former Quartermaster Franklin G. Comstock. The group planned to take the 7 p.m. train back to Richland and gathered on the platform to begin boarding. Albert waited until the train moved before attempting to board the last car. The Pulaski Democrat reported what happened next:

His left foot must have slipped upon the step, passed through, and became entangled. He lost hold of the irons, fell backward, and was thus dragged two and a half miles before the remains of his body became detached from the car. Quartermaster Comstock and others at Sand Bank saw enough of his mishap in getting aboard to excite their fear that all was not well, and they followed along the track until they found his hat, a boot, and stocking and discovered other evidence of the awful catastrophe. They at once telegraphed to Mr. H. H. Mellen at Richland Station, who, when the train arrived without Capt. Fellows put a box on the hand car and went up the road until he found what remained of the body and met the Sand Bank party picking up the fragments. The details are too shocking to dwell upon, and our readers must be content to know that he was torn to pieces.

The Oswego Daily Palladium eulogized him on Jan. 3, announcing Capt.'s death. Fellows was received with sorrow by many in this city, who had become attached to him on account of his many winning virtues, his frank and manly bearing, his generous, impulsive, yet kindly disposition, and his devoted attachment to his country, which showed itself when that country stood most in need of strong arms and brave hearts to defend her from the assault of treason. Some entered the army for preferment or love of gain, but Capt. Fellows seemed fired by pure patriotism and went into the service of his country deeply impressed with the sacredness of her cause and did noble work therein.

Ironically, a man who had served in two regiments, had been captured and confined by the enemy, and had survived to talk about his experiences should meet with such a tragic, senseless end. Captain Fellows lies in the family plot in Pulaski Village Cemetery. A beautiful gravestone paying tribute to his military service marks his final resting place.

<u>Regional Bibles:</u> President William Howard Taft's Mexico, NY Family The Cynthia Taft Butler (1773-1837) Family Bible (1810)

(Mexico) In early March, our long-time member Larry Rogers of New Haven brought in a box of old papers and a small Bible he had purchased from an estate in Mexico a few years ago. Among the papers was a small Bible printed in 1810 that Larry said linked the Schmidt family of Mexico to the 27th American president and 10th chief justice of the Supreme Court, William Howard Taft (1856-1927). Initially skeptical, we ran the data and confirmed that the small red Bible was given to Rawson Butler (1806-1865) on Oct. 28, 1831, by his maiden aunt, Sophia Taft (1787-1843). Sophia Taft was Rawson's maternal aunt as well as the paternal GG Great Aunt of President William Howard Taft (1856-1927), making the last owner of the Bible, past Half-Shire member Ralph Schmidt (1921-2007), a 4th cousin of the president. Ralph's mother's great-grandmother, Cynthia Taft Butler (1773-1837), lived and died in Mexico, NY. She was a great-grand aunt of President Taft.

This Bible is a "gateway record" to Revolutionary War soldier Aaron Taft (1743-1808), who served as a minuteman in Captain Joseph Chapin's unit, which responded to the Lexington Alarm in April 1775. Aaron Taft's wife, Rhoda Rawson (1749-1827), was herself the granddaughter of Edward Rawson (1615-1693), an early Harvard graduate who served as secretary of the Massachusetts Bay Colony.
